A Message from the President Organized TRIO

Warmest greetings to the Mid-America Association of Educational Opportunity Program Personnel (MAEOPP)! Our theme for this year stems from my belief that TRIO is the founding-father of all educational opportunity programs...we are... Organized TRIO: Leading the way to expand educational opportunity and success.

Throughout the year, the Association's work will focus on recognizing our past 40 years of accomplishments, on evaluating our progress toward the goals of our current strategic plan, and on proactively responding to the national college access and success movement, including priorities critical to TRIO's survival. As we continue to lead the way to expand educational opportunity, college access and success, the ten states making up MAEOPP are actively engaged in activities to promote and defend college access and success for all individuals, to provide professional development and training to our members and affiliates, and to award scholarships to students. I know, together as the MAEOPP family, we will work hard to protect over 40 years of advocacy for our students and programs.

The MAEOPP Education Foundation (MEF) will be awarding \$15,000 in scholarships during Fiscal 2014. In addition to MAEOPP Board of Directors scholarships at \$1,000/student in each of the ten states within the MAEOPP region, others will be awarded under the scholarship funds established in the names of Silas Purnell, Ralph Pruitt, Arnold Mitchem Graduate Fellowship, Emerging Leaders, and Veterans. On behalf of MAEOPP, I thank MEF President Otis Williams and the entire MEF Board for the work they do, and I extend a warm welcome to the newly elected MEF Board Member Dr. Jonathan McKenzie (Illinois TRIO Past President, MAEOPP Past President and former COE Board Chair).

MEF will also be submitting to the MAEOPP Best Practices Center the Illinois Scholarship Program (ISP) in hopes of being designated as a 'validated' program in 2014. Whether at the promising, validated, or exemplary level, consider submitting your program's best practice. There is even an administrative best practice level. Your Chapter leaders are diligently working to communicate and connect with you and our constituents across our region to continue building the alliances that have been forged over the years. I encourage you to take part in chapter, regional, and national-level professional development opportunities to enable us to build our capacity to serve first generation, low income students so that they have the opportunity, support, and guidance to reach their goals of academic achievement in higher education.

The training institute is designed to improve participants' knowledge of TRIO regulations and TRIO CAS standards and to enhance participants' management skills with the goal of improving their respective projects. MN TRIO has been busy in recent months with Work Day, advocacy in the media, and testifying before a US Senate Committee. Each of these activities has continued the advocacy and support of TRIO and the students that we work with every day.

"Re-Visioning" was the theme of MN TRIO's Work Day which was held on December 6th. MN TRIO President Dory Pohl encouraged the 55 attendees to think beyond what's been done and to look at things from a fresh perspective. How can we move forward to be the most effective and efficient we can be? Attendees had a choice to participate in sessions addressing re-visioning future Work Days and the Annual Conference or help the association in strategic planning or legislative and education efforts. One of President Pohl's goals was to orient new professionals in the history of past efforts and activities while moving everyone into the future together.

While at Work Day some attendees wrote a response letter, published on December 13th, to the Star Tribune Opinion editors about the successes of the MN TRIO pre-college programs. This letter was written in response to an article that was published on December 4th that highlighted the successes of two college access programs but failed to include TRIO. This letter prompted Dr. O'Brien, Interim Vice Chancellor of Academic and Student Affairs and Minnesota State Colleges and Universities, to send MN TRIO a letter applauding us for our work with low-income and first-generation students.

In January, MN TRIO President Elect Tallie Sertich was chosen to testify before the US Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions regarding TRIO and the Higher Education Reauthorization. President Elect Sertich spoke eloquently about the struggles that TRIO students face, especially the TRIO students in rural areas which demonstrated the need to continue funding and supporting TRIO programs.

MN TRIO continues its efforts supporting the low-income and first-generations students in our programs. We also continue our advocacy for all TRIO.

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Kaye Monk-Morgan MAEOPP President-Elect

Kaye Monk-Morgan was only 26 in 1997 when Wichita State University hired her to direct its Upward Bound program.

It is a fiercely demanding job. Her students say she made it more so. In many ways, in the years since then, analysts say her job has become a critical factor in whether Wichita keeps growing.

Morgan grew up gifted but poor not far from North High School. Upward Bound coaxes such kids to take difficult courses, then attend college. This is where the really demanding part comes in.

One of Morgan's lifelong mentors, James Rhatigan, the former dean of students at WSU, said poverty tends to teach some poor children to say no to themselves, to say no to people trying to help them.

Morgan's students say that what happened after they hired her is the stuff of WSU Upward Bound legend.

"The true test of someone is what you do after the entire system around you says no to you," Rhatigan said. "That's when we find out who you really are."

Donna's message for the young people was for them to go out in the world and take their place, "even if they have to bring in their own chair." TRIO Works and Donna is an excellent example of this!

Past President's Corner

Dr. Arnold Mitchem has been a voice for low-income, first-generation students, individuals with disabilities, adult learners, and veterans throughout his career.

Dr. Mitchem was the founding president of the Mid America Association of Educational Opportunity Program Personnel from 1974-1976.

Formally established in 1975, the Mid-America Association of Educational Opportunity Program Personnel (MAEOPP) is a recognized 501(c)3 non-profit consortium of professionals with the specific purpose of leveling the playing field of educational opportunity for first-generation, low-income, and disabled students. MAEOPP is the representative professional body for colleges, universities and agencies that host federally-funded TRIO educational opportunity programs within ten states in the great Midwest.

MAEOPP advocates on behalf of those persons least likely to enroll in and obtain a college degree at our nation's higher education institutions and is a member organization of the internationally recognized Council for Opportunity in Education (COE), also founded by Dr. Mitchem.

Dr. Mitchem has received many awards for his accomplishments. Some of them include:

- Arturo Schomburg Distinguished Service Award from the Association for Equality and Excellence in Education, Inc.
- The 2013 Award for Advocacy of Independent Higher Education from the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (NAICU)
- The Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) Award of Excellence (2013).
